OPEN LETTER

Victorian Government called out for neglecting abuse towards children in youth prisons

Reports of human rights abuses have emerged from Victoria's youth prisons, including:

- solitary confinement on children up to 22 hours a day, and;
- the use of spit-hooding on a 17-year old Aboriginal child in an adult prison.

20 January marks one year since the VIC, NSW and QLD governments missed the deadline to meet Australia's obligations to the UN Convention Against Torture (OPCAT).

OPCAT requires independent oversight, monitoring and inspections of all places of detention, including police cells, prisons and youth prisons.
